Shasta Environmental Alliance has selected five excellent and deserving individuals for their work in protecting our natural environment in the Sacramento River Watershed. They will be honored at a presentation on Friday, November 22, 6:30 pm at the First United Methodist Church, 1825 East St, Redding.

*Peggy Rebol* was selected on the basis of her work on many environmental issues, especially for helping establish, organize and run the Whole Earth and Watershed Festival for the last 14 years as well as her work educating children about our environment. She is also an active participant in North State Climate Action among many other activities.

*Doug Craig* was selected for his many years educating the public about the threat of climate change through many articles, letters to the editor and producing radio programs interviewing many experts in the field. He has also organized public forums, films and spoken to many groups about the threats of climate change. Currently he is working with North State Climate Action and produces a radio program on KKRN.

Larry Jordan has worked with Wintu Audubon to protect our native birds and to educate the

public about their importance in our environment. He has also established a population of

burrowing owls at Tuscan Preserve, in Butte County, with the help of volunteers he organized. He

is webmaster of the Wintu Audubon website, leads many bird walks, set up many monitored

songbird nest boxes and gives talks on birds using his excellent photographs of birds he has taken over the years.

Julie Kierstead Nelson is a U.S.F.S. Botanist, a specialist in the sub-alpine areas in and around Mt. Shasta, Mt. Eddy and the Trinity Alps. She is a coauthor of two books on native plants in our area. She has also been instrumental in discovering and/or describing five rare plants in our area including: Shasta maidenhair fern, Shasta fawn lily, Shasta huckleberry, The Eddy's stonecrop and her latest, a recently discovered and as yet officially unnamed species of *Phacelia*.

*Rize Oliviera* is the winner of our high school student category. Recently Rize produced and hosted a Small World Radio show to coincide with the UN Climate Action Summit (September 2019). The show is about Student Climate Activists. Rize is currently one of the four hosts of the

one-minute Public Service Announcement EXTINCTION DIARIES which is archived on Pacifica radio and immediately began airing on 5 stations. She is an A student at Foothill High School and participated in track at the Junior Olympics.

This event also will be a social mixer with refreshments. We hope you will join us, mill around and socialize, then sit down for a ceremony when we'll recognize the work of these local environmental heroes. ### SEA Redding Recycling Center Field Trip and Tour Report

Shasta Environmental Alliance led a great tour of the City of Redding Recycling center with 18 very interested participants. We started off with a great talk by Solid Waste Deputy Director Paul Clemens who answered many questions for about 45 minutes. Despite some turmoil in the recycling market, he stated all recycled material is resold for reuse even if the price is quite low. Then he gave us a 45 minute walking tour of the recycling center as material was being separated. Fortunately, he has a loud voice and we were usually able to hear him over the din of the equipment. #### CNPS Castle Crags Fall Colors Field Trip Sunday, Nov. 3, 9 am

Join the Shasta Chapter of California Native Plant Society on a Castle Crags Fall Colors field trip. This will be a one-way, five-mile hike in Castle Crags State Park, starting on the Flume Creek Trail and taking the Pacific Crest Trail to the Burstarse Falls Trailhead, and back by car shuttle. We should see a variety of plants, from buckbrush to California hazel, various dogwoods, oaks, and conifers. This is an excellent time to walk this trail of beautiful vistas, with the crunch of fallen black oak, bigleaf maple, dogwood, and other leaves underfoot. It is an easy to moderately difficult hike for most people. However, those with poor balance should not go on this hike because there are three creek crossings (mostly small and dry) and some steep sections. Those needing assistance to traverse these areas can create a safety hazard for all participants in the group. No dogs allowed on Park trails. Bring layered clothing, water, and food. #### ACORNS: A NATIVE AMERICAN STAPLE Horsetown Clear Creek Preserve Sunday, November 3, 1 p.m.

Native Wintu herbalist Ted Dawson will discuss the acorn, from harvest to food items. You'll be invited to join in grinding acorns with mortar and pestle and be rewarded with the best acorn dishes in Shasta County. You're probably aware that acorns were a staple food of the Native Americans of California, but there's more. Bring the family. #### Carr Fire Recovery in Chaparral and Oak Woodlands Field Trip Saturday, December 7, 2019

Secondary Succession Following the Carr Fire in Chaparral and Oak Woodlands (with Acorn Planting). This will be a joint CNPS and Shasta Environmental Alliance fieldtrip on

a three mile walk through a burned area of the Carr Fire that will include the planting of 200 or more blue oak acorns and a few gray pine seeds. Walk leader David Ledger will identify different plants on the trail and note their responses to fire and the probable progression of vegetation recovery of the area over the next 10 years. Bring a hand trowel to help plant acorns and seeds. It will take about 30 to 45 minutes to plant the seeds; the rest of the time will be spent walking a trail and seeing how different chaparral and oak woodland plants are recovering. #### California Birds in a Changing Climate, Wednesday, December 11th @ 7pm at the McConnell Foundation

Wintu Audubon Program: As our climate changes, the entire web of life must adapt or perish. If a flower blooms earlier due to increased temperatures, insects that depend on that flower must hatch earlier, and birds that consume those insects must arrive from their spring migration earlier. Whether birds will be able to adapt to this change is uncertain. National Audubon has determined that 50% of birds will be threatened by climate change. During this program, Dr. Wendy Schackwitz will explain the science behind this research and provide a set of actions that you can take to help climatethreatened birds. She will discuss how Citizen Science projects such as Breeding Bird Surveys and Christmas Bird Counts were used to identify bird population trends.
